### ECLIPSES IN 1897.

Of the Sun two; of the Moon none. I. FEBRUARY 1. Annular Eclipse of the Sun. Visible as a partial Eclipse in the S. E. of Australia, New Zealand, the South Pacific, the S. E. of the United States, Central America, and South America (except the S. Eastern portion). The line of central Eclipse passes from the N. of New Zealand across the Pacific and over

S. America from Buenaventura to the Gulf of Paria. The Eclipse begins on the earth generally at 5h 23m p.m. in Long. 176° W. and Lat. 28° S.; ends at 11h 8m p.m. in Long. 78° W. and Lat. 15° N. II. JULY 29. Annular Eclipse of the Sun. Visible as a partial Eclipse in the part of N. and S. America included between a line joining Vancouver with Newfoundland and one crossing from Lima to the Eastern portion of Uruguay, the Atlantic, Senegambia, and Upper and Lower Guinea. The line of central Eclipse passes over Mexico, Havannah, Porto Rico, and touches S. America near Cape St. Roque. The Eclipse begins on the earth generally at 1h 2m p.m. in Long. 110° W. and Lat. 17° N.; ends at 6h 52m p.m. in Long. 19° W. and Lat. 21° S.

**THE CALENDARS.**

The Jewish is in accordance with the system arranged A.D. 358. The Calendar dates from the Creation, which is fixed as 3760 years and 3 months before the beginning of the Christian Era; the year is Luni-solar.

The Mohammedan, or era of the Hejira, dates from the day after Mahomet's flight from Mecca, which occurred on the night of July 15, 622 A.D. The months are Lunar.

The Fasli year was derived from a combination of the Hejira and Samvat years by the order of Akbar; it is Luni-solar. The Bengali year seems also to have been related at one time to the Hejira, but the fact of its being Solar made it lose 11 days each year.

The Samvat era dates from 57 B.C., and is Luni-solar. The months are divided into two fortnights—*sudi* or bright and *badi* or dark. Each fortnight contains 15 tithis, which furnish the dates of the civil days given in our calendars.
